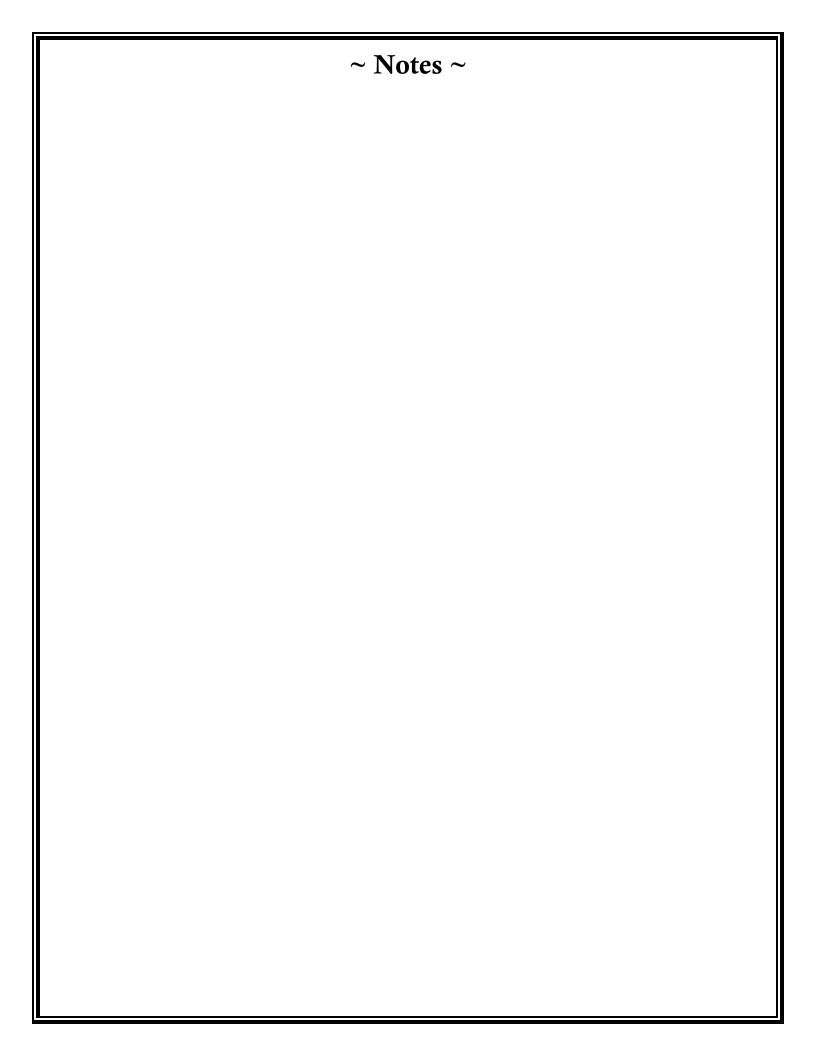

How to Calculate Your NH Property Tax Bill

Property tax bills in New Hampshire are determined using these factors:

1. The property's assessed value 2. The tax rate where the property is located

For example, the owner of a home with an assessed value of \$300,000 in a town where the tax rate is \$23.06 would receive a bill of \$6,918. $$300,000 / $1,000 = $300 \times $23.06 = $6,918 \text{ (tax bill)}$

Here's a breakdown of the calculation:

- 1. The assessed value (\$300,000) is divided by \$1,000 (since the tax rate is based on every \$1,000 of the property's assessed value).
 - 2. Multiply the result (\$300) by the local tax rate (\$23.06).
 - 3. The result (\$6,918) is the homeowner's property tax bill.

Using Lempster's Tax Rate:

\$300,000 / \$1,000 = \$300 x \$27.11 = \$8,133 Municipal Portion \$300 x \$5.77 = \$1,731 County Portion \$3.82 x \$3.82 = \$1,146 School Portion (\$1.77 + \$15.75) \$300 x \$17.52 = \$5,256

Phil Tirrell talked about this article and explained how these funds are used. Article five passed by hand vote.

Article 06 Town Building CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 to be added to the Town Building Repair Expendable Trust (CIP 012) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Motion by Alvin McNeill, seconded by Richard Fairweather

Selectman Mary Grenier talked about this article. Mary answer questions about how much money was currently in this CIP, and what this money is used for. Fire Chief Thomas stated that this money is used for all Town Buildings not just the Town Office. Alan Chandler made a motion to amend this article to \$5000.00 seconded by Korrie Goodspeed. Motion to amend failed by hand vote. Article six passed by hand vote.

Article 07 Emergency Response CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be added to the Emergency Response Capital Reserve (CIP 051) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Phil Tirrell, seconded by David Richards

Phil Tirrell explained that these funds help during a major fire or natural disaster. Much discussion was had. Alvin McNeill made a motion to cease debate seconded by Maggie Kemp; motion passed. Article seven passed by hand count.

Article 08 Forest Fire Truck CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be added to the Forest Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund (CIP 055) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required)

Forest Fire Warden David Richards spoke about the current truck, the age of truck, and the importance for a new truck in the future. Article eight passed by hand count.

Fire Chief Thomas spoke about this article and explained these funds are used to put new dry hydrants around town. Article 10 Fire Department Equipment CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to be added to the Fire Department Equipment Capital Reserve (CIP 036) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion Jon Thomas, seconded by Alvin McNeill

Fire Chief Thomas spoke about this article and some of the equipment and repairs this fund covers. Chief Thomas talked about the cost of gear that is used by each member of the department and the federal requirements that must be met. Much discussion was had about how much money was currently in this CIP, the use of grants, how long a set of gear lasts, and if the department had any planned purchase this year. Alvin McNeill made a motion to cease debate seconded James Grenier; motion passed. Article ten passed by hand vote.

Article 11 Rescue Equipment CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be added to the Rescue Equipment Capital Reserve (CIP 052) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Joe Moulton, seconded by Beth Clark Moulton

Rescue Captain Beth Clark Moulton spoke about what equipment was purchased from this fund this year (2022). Article eleven passed by hand vote.

Article 12 Rescue Squad Truck CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500.00 to be added to the Rescue Squad Truck Capital Reserve (CIP 054) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Alvin McNeill, seconded by Joe Moulton

Rescue Captain Beth Clark Moulton explained that the current rescue truck is due to be replaced in 2025, and the cost of a new truck. Article twelve passed by hand vote

Article 13 Appraisal of Property

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,900.00 to be added to the Appraisal of Property Capital Reserve (CIP 027) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Mary Grenier, seconded by Robert Porter

Selectman Mary Grenier explained what is covered with these funds stating that the whole town is appraised every five years as required by state law. Korrie Goodspeed asked if we have looked into any other vendors other than Avitar, Mary said at this time the board has not taken any other quotes. Article thirteen passed by hand vote.

Article 14 Town Office Information Technology CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 to be added to the Town Office Information Technology Capital Reserve (CIP 037) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Alvin McNeill, seconded by Carol Stamatakis

Selectman Traci Homol explained what is covered with these funds and stated that in the past year the Town Office has hired a new IT company, upgraded the server, and upgraded one of the computers in the office. There are still three more computers that will need to be upgraded. Article fourteen passed by hand vote.

Article 15 Town Bridge ET

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to be added to the Town Bridge and Culverts Expendable Trust (CIP 018) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Mary Grenier, seconded by Everett Thurber

Selectman Everett Thurber talked about the work that was completed over the past year. Selectman Thurber explained that there are still two bridges in town that need to be capped with concrete. He stated that the work being done will extend the life of our bridges in town. Article fifteen passed by hand vote.

Article 16 Town Highway Equipment CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to be added to the Town Highway Equipment Capital Reserve (CIP 026) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Daryl Simino, seconded by Mark Adams

Highway Supervisor Daryl Simino spoke about how this fund is used and mentioned that the body on the 2009 will need to be replaced due to the condition. Article Sixteen passed by hand vote.

Article 17 Road Reconstruction and Paving CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,000.00 to be added to the Road Reconstruction and Paving Capital Reserve (CIP 048) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Daryl Simino, seconded by Debbie Simino

Highway Supervisor Daryl Simino spoke about the miles of black top in town, the cost of new black top, and maintaining the existing black top. Much discussion was had regarding the life of the black top on Mountain Road, what roads need to be resealed, what roads are next, and the type of materials that are being used. James Grenier made a motion to cease debate seconded by Traci Homol; motion passed. Article seventeen passed by hand vote.

Article 18 Grader CR

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 to be added to the Grader Capital Reserve (CIP 057) previously established.

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Mary Grenier, seconded by Magie Kemp

Highway Supervisor Daryl Simino spoke about the condition of the current grader; he explained that it is old and tired and is starting to cost more than it is worth to fix as parts are hard to find and are very expensive. When it comes time to purchase a new grader the town will look into purchasing a slightly used grader from one of the surrounding towns if possible. Article eighteen passed by hand vote.

Article 19 Long Pond Wharf

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for the purpose of removing and replacing 90 feet of the existing log bumper on the Long Pond Wharf with non-treated logs. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Everett Thurber, seconded by Mary Grenier

Selectman Everett Thurber explained due to unforeseen issues with volunteers not being able to continue working on this project the town had to put it out to bid. The bid to have the work completed is \$34,500.00. Much discussion was had regarding the materials being used, why the volunteers couldn't continue, and DES permitting. Glen Wirkkala made a motion to cease debate seconded Phil Tirrell; motion passed. Article nineteen passed by hand vote.

Article 20 Transfer Station Equipment CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be added to the Transfer Station Equipment Capital Reserve (CIP 021) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Joe Moulton, seconded by Daryl Simino

Highway Supervisor Daryl Simino spoke about the current packer at the transfer station, the cost and importance of the replacing the current packer. Article twenty passed by hand vote.

Article 21 Professional Assistance Contingency

Mark Adams of the Planning Board spoke about the Planning Board's budget and how they have been able to level fund with no increases to their budget for quite some time. James Grenier asked if this money can only be used for one project, Mark Adams explained that these funds will also be used for other upcoming projects including digitizing the Planning Board records to make them more accessible to the public. Article 22 Landfill Closure CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Landfill Closure Capital Reserve (CIP 022) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Alvin McNeill, seconded by Robert Porter

Selectman Everett Thurber explained that when the times comes to fully close the old landfill it will be a very expensive project that could cost an estimated \$300,000.00 plus to complete. Article twenty-two passed by hand vote.

Article 23 New Cemetery CR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the New Cemetery Capital Reserve (CIP 023) previously established. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Traci Homol, seconded by Glen Wirkkala

Cemetery Trustee Carol Stamatakis explained that these funds will be used to continue to develop the new section of the cemetery. Article twenty three passed by hand vote.

Article 24 Elderly Exemption

Shall the town MODIFY the provisions of RSA 72:39-a for elderly exemption from property tax in the Town of Lempster, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$40,000.00; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$60,000.00; for a person 80 years of age or older \$80,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 3 consecutive years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married to each other for at least 5 consecutive years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$20,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$28,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$70,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence. (Majority vote required)

Motion by Traci Homol, seconded by Everett Thurber

Selectman Traci Homol explained what this article would change if passed. Stating that this article would change the income limits needed to qualify for an elderly exemption. Much discussion was had regarding the current levels of income compared to the proposed income levels in this article. Jacob Champness made a motion to amend and double all dollar amounts in this article seconded by Mary Fallon. More discussion was had what amending this article would mean to the other taxpayers in town. Motion to amend failed by hand vote. Jacob Champness made a motion to cease debate seconded Robin Maguire; motion passed. Article twenty four passed as originally presented by hand vote.

Article 25 Optional Veteran's Tax Credit

Shall the town READOPT the OPTIONAL VETERANS TAX CREDIT in accordance with RSA 72:28, II, for an annual tax credit on residential property of \$300.00? (Majority vote required)

Motion by Alvin McNeill, seconded by Phil Tirrell

Selectman Mary Grenier explained that due to a change in the law the town(s) need to vote to readopt the Optional Veteran's tax credit. Article twenty-five passed by hand vote.

Article 26 Resolution by Petition

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution, to read as follows: Be it resolved that the Select Board shall, pursuant to RSA 31:41-a, motor vehicle race tracks, make bylaws, with the advice of the Planning Board, relating to the regulation and licensing of motor vehicle race tracks within the limits of the Town of Lempster.

Motion by Richard Fairweather, seconded by Jennifer Gildner-Blinn

Read Gildner-Blinn explained this petition article; Mr. Gildner-Blinn talked about the different things that could be covered under by-laws if this article passes. Much discussion was had regarding if permits and State mandates were being met, how long this article would be in place, what if anything would the Town of Lempster be responsible for, and how would this affect our Fire/Rescues Department. Alvin McNeill made a motion to cease debate seconded Mary Grenier; motion passed. Moderator Shklar made announcement that a request had been made to have the vote by paper ballot at the beginning of the meeting. Moderator Shklar reopened the polls at 9:02 pm and closed the polls for this article at 9:37 pm. Article twenty six failed by ballot vote No Votes 51/ Yes Votes 43.

Article 27 Any other business

To transact any other business that may legally come before this Town Meeting.

Motion by Alvin McNeill, seconded by Traci Homo

Korrie Goodspeed talked about the town thinking about a Budget Committee in the future. Fire Chief Jon Thomas said that both the Fire and Rescue department are in need of volunteers. Anyone who is interested can stop by the Station on Wednesday nights. Selectman Traci Homol let everyone know that a dance is planned for May 6th, 2023 at the Meeting House on Lempster Street, and the Ladies Auxiliary will be holding a bake sale. Article twenty-seven passed by hand vote.

Motion to adjourn the meeting made by Everett Thurber at 9:50 pm, seconded by Linda Callahan all in favor.

Auditor's Report

The responsibility of a locally elected town auditor is identified in RSA 41:31-c:

All municipalities shall annually, or more often as necessary, conduct an audit of the accounts of any officer or agent handling funds of the municipality. Elected auditors conducting such audits shall follow audit procedures in rules adopted by the Commissioner of the Department of Revenue Administration pursuant to RSA 541-A.

The auditing process follows the form, MS-60. This form has a section for each town department that handles town funds; general ledger, treasurer, tax collector, trustees of trust funds, town clerk and library. The specific sections have questions designed to identify if pertinent statutes are being followed and, generally, if fiscally sound practices are being practiced. Even for those expenditures not authorized through the select board, all expenditures of town funds are subject to this audit.

The 2022 auditor report was completed and returned to DRA before April1of 2023. Once all of the 2023 data is available, I will meet with the individuals responsible for the six areas to be covered in the town auditor report. The final report will be completed and returned to the Department of Revenue Administration by April 1, 2024. Recent DRA rule changes have clarified the responsibility of municipalities to complete this audit and have it finished by April 1; there are now monetary penalties if the audit is not completed by April 1, 2024 or not done at all. I have completed the Lempster town audit each year since fiscal year 2005 and will be certain to have this year's audit completed and sent to DRA by April 1.

For the fiscal year it is important for each department to spend no more than the money appropriated at last town meeting by the residents of Lempster. Any funds not spent must become part of the general fund of the town. At the end of each fiscal year a breakdown of all expenditures for each department must be made to the residents via the town report as well as the amount of unspent funds, if any.

The employees responsible for receiving funds, handling funds and paying town expenses are doing so efficiently and are complying with State RSA's. Records of receipts and expenditures are being accurately recorded and appropriately filed by town employees.

Cemetery Trustees

The Lempster Cemetery Trustees are responsible for maintaining the Town Cemetery, located behind the town offices on the corner of Route 10 and the 2nd NH Turnpike. The Trustees assist family members who wish to have a loved one interred at the cemetery and help coordinate arrangements for burial. The Cemetery Trustees actively promote a tradition of stewardship of the cemetery within the community and appreciation of its cultural and historical significance. Information about the cemetery and current rules can be found on the Cemetery Trustees page of the Town web site.

The Cemetery Trustees have continued to develop the "new" area of the cemetery. This past year the Trustees engaged the services of Surveyor Clayton Platt to establish boundaries and lay out lots in the area to the south of the access road. This is the next area where burials will be taking place. The Cemetery Trustees also took on a project to lay out bluestone on the access road. This project was paid for by funds from the Larry Johnson Trust that benefits the cemetery. Stone Vault was engaged to repair and straighten gravestones, as has been done for many years.

The fourth-grade students of the Lempster Community School, along with their teacher Lynne Clough and other members of the community, came to the cemetery on May $23^{\rm rd}$ to place flags on the graves of veterans in preparation for Memorial Day. Glenn Wirkkala, Ivan Wallace and Reggie Shepard dressed as Revolutionary War soldiers and Everett Thurber as a Civil War soldier and provided demonstrations and history lessons for the students. A visit to History Hall with members of the Lempster Historical Society followed.

The Trustees organized a "Living History" Cemetery Walk for Old Home Day Sunday. Lempster residents Becky Ferrand, Bob Cilley and Michael Shklar portrayed Lempster historical figures Mary Elizabeth Perley, Samuel S. Harris and George Bancroft Griffin, sharing stories from their lives that were well-researched and presented. 45-50 people enjoyed the program.

Greg Lynch, our Cemetery Maintenance Contractor, submitted his resignation, effective at the end of the year. The Trustees have appreciated the commitment to the cemetery and community that he brought to his work and wish him well.

Lempster Conservation Commission Report 2023

The Conservation Commission has been actively involved in managing and protecting the town's valuable lands. Our Commission is a member of the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions and as such training opportunities, educational seminars, and guidance is available at low or no cost to our commission

We continue to work to improve the trails in the town forest. Duck Pond Trail, Lady Slipper Trail, Beaver Meadow Trail and Moose Trail off Long Pond Road have been maintained throughout the year. A new trail that starts at the Town Beach at Long Pond has been named River Ledge Trail. That trail connects with Moose Trail and is an easy walk down to the Beaver Meadow. These trails are in the process of being remarked with location markers and names. An updated map will be available at the Kiosk, at the parking area, this spring. Trail maps and handouts are currently available at the town office.

The orchard on Earls Lane is being worked on to salvage many of the trees. We have contracted with Matt Magnusson of Northeast Forest Services to do the cutting and pruning necessary to restore this orchard. There is a plan on how best to share the bounty of this orchard with the entire community. We have future plans for a parklike area on this 30 acre lot and we purchased the first picnic table that was placed this past fall.

Porta Potties were set out at both Earls Lane and Duck Pond hiking area this year. Several people have expressed their appreciation for their availability.

The PTSA/PTO and Lempster Fire Auxiliary have adopted Lovejoy Road and a sign has been installed to indicate their commitment. A replacement sign on Second NH Turnpike, indicating that the Lempster Conservation Commission has adopted the section from Hurd Road to Route 10 has been made and installed by the NHDOT. If your group or organization is interested in adopting a road please contact the Conservation Commission.

The LCC supports the NH Lakes program for both Long Pond and Sand Pond to inspect boats and trailers for invasive aquatic plants and animal species prior to entering our pristine waters. Currently we have no infestations in these two lakes. We also support the Ashuelot River and Cold River LACs that provide testing and monitoring of these two rivers. The rivers that run through Lempster have tested very clean, but lower Ashuelot River has had increased levels of Phosphorus perhaps related to beaver activity.

The River Road area is being used as a new Conservation walking trail. We will continue to investigate solutions for a pedestrian walking bridge that crosses Dodge Brook.

If you are interested in being involved in the Conservation of our town properties please feel free to attend a meeting or reach out to one of our members.

The last year was one that was not void of challenges and successes, every year has its way of throwing new curve balls at the department. Some of the challenges include, daytime coverage of calls, mother nature, and personal/family schedules. Successes include the addition of two new members, training of members, and the upcoming addition of Advanced Life Support to the department.

Just like every year before we want to inform about the ability to join the departments. Our doors are always open to those who want to make a difference in their community, learn skills, and challenge themselves physically and mentally. The department meets every Wednesday at 7pm. We welcome anyone that can bring positivity to our great organization regardless of age, and experience.

Lempster Fire and Rescue is looking at the future and ways to cover the daytime responses. We are tracking metrics on calls to better find a solution. In the mean time we have dedicated members who are always doing their best to cover these calls. We ask that the towns people be supportive of the department as we work to a solution and find a way to best provide services 24-7. This problem is not unique to Lempster, this is a regional and national issue.

The members not only answer calls, they work to improve themselves and the town through education. In a short amount of time the town is going to have two members that will be able to provide Advanced Life Support to the towns people. This will reduce the time to life saving interventions immensely. We are also excited that the state has allowed us to train in house for firefighting, we have two members taking advantage of this already. We also ask for the support of the town on building some props to facilitate this training properly.

Above and beyond the day-to-day activities in 2024 we look to bring back some of the previous traditions that we missed out on due to the Covid pandemic and inclement weather of years past. We hope to also add some new events to the already existing list of: Holiday events, winter gatherings, and most of all Old Home Day just to name a few. The men and women really enjoy these events and appreciate being the hub of activity during these times of community gathering.

This past year Lempster Fire and Rescue answered 118 calls for service. 50 Medical, 10 Building fires, 6 Cover Assignments, 17 MVAs, 5 MVAs with entrapment, 3 Chimney Fires, 6 Trees and Wires, 2 Alarm Activations, 2 Landing Zone calls, 5 Service Calls, 3 Brush Fires, 5 Tech Rescue/ice rescue/water rescue, 2 Haz-Mat, 2 CO. These calls are always handled with pride, ownership, and compassion with nothing less than professional volunteerism.

Both of these gentlemen have taken a very hard role on this past year. As expressed last year the department is having a very hard time with day time coverage. While these 2 don't do it alone as we have other members who are available some days, these 2 have stepped up to respond to fire and medical calls alike. They both are past licensed emergency responders but now just hold basic First aid and CPR. But they go to as many calls as they can because some times just a friendly face can make someone feel better just by being there. They do all they can to make the patient comfortable and treat them to their highest ability and help the ambulance crew when they arrive. 2023 Forest Fire Report

To the residents of the Town of Lempster,

Due to the improved conditions of Covid-19, the spring warden trainings were conducted in person this year.

This year we observed wet weather through most of the fire season. Fortunately the fire danger remained low for the majority of the year and there was very little fire activity with nothing burning out of control.

Permits issued for 2022:

- 42 Category 1 (cooking fire)
- 19 Category 2 (camp fire)
- 80 Category 3 (brush fire)
- 1 Category 4 (commercial fire)

Seventy-six of these permits were obtained through the state online permit system. Permits can be obtained online at nhfirepermit.com (Please note that online permits include a processing fee that covers website development and maintenance.) Permits obtained in person are still free. Permits can be issued by David and Carrie Richards, Barb Richards, and Jon Thomas.

Deputy Wardens appointed for the Town of Lempster are Jon Thomas, Thomas Moore, Jr. and Joseph Moulton, Jr. Issuing agents are Barbara Richards and Carrie Richards.

In the fall, Lempster Fire personnel were able to join with personnel from Unity and Goshen for a couple of combined training operations including personnel from the Division of Forest and Lands. During the training event, personnel worked at a higher command level than they normally would have at a scene. This allowed for expansion of personal ability and experience.

Subdivisions, Annexations and Mergers:

Della Fulton subdivision was approved on February 13th.

Excavations:

An excavation permit for Howard Family Holdings, LLC on Route 10 was granted on September 11th.

All six excavation sites in Lempster are inspected yearly and this was done in October. All excavation sites were found to be in compliance with permitting and no major concerns were found.

Gary Caron requested to close his excavation permit on Caron Drive. The reclamation was found to be complete and the permit closed on November 13th.

A total of 3 driveway permits were issued on town roads.

Drift New England has submitted updated plans and copies of state permit applications to the board during the year. Currently, the plan is still conceptual and no town permits have been applied for.

Read Gildner-Blinn and Traci Homol were appointed as the representatives to the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission. Read Gildner-Blinn was appointed to a four year term. Traci Homol was appointed to a two year term that would be renewed as a four year term to provide staggered terms.

The Planning Board met with department heads and the Select Board in November to discuss and create the 2024 CIP (Capital Improvements Plan).

Throughout the year, the Board has held work sessions to review and update the Master Plan.

I would like to thank the citizens of Lempster for allowing us the opportunity to continue to provide law enforcement services for another year. 2023 has brought a few significant changes. To start, Chief Deputy Jeremy Wilson has retired from the Sheriff's Office after nine years of service to the County, and over thirty years of law enforcement service to the State of New Hampshire. Jeremy was a major asset to the Sullivan County Sheriff's Office overseeing daily operations.

He was also responsible for our successful drone program. Our drones have been used many times over the past two years for a range of law enforcement and non-law enforcement calls for service. Emergency service agencies throughout the county have used the drone service for natural disasters, fires and other needs that have arisen.

Over the past year, we have acquired an additional, much larger drone, that will allow us to fly in more situations than ever before. We will be able to fly in inclement weather with increased flight times and a longer range of visibility. New technology acquisitions are always sought after and well utilized to help keep the Sheriff's Office current with the ever-changing landscape of law enforcement. Please join me in thanking Jeremy for his hard work and dedication. Congratulations on a well-deserved retirement. Everyone here at the Sheriff's Office wishes you well.

Since the retirement of Jeremy Wilson, former Sergeant Ethan Yazinski has taken his place and will be the new Chief Deputy. We have also recently hired Charles Mcleman who was a long-time sergeant and former lieutenant from the Newport Police Department. Charlie brings many years of law enforcement and leadership experience to the Sheriff's Office, and we look forward to having him on the team. We further anticipate the acquisition of another full-time deputy within the next few months to bring us back to a full staff.

Another project I would like to mention from this past year is a grant from the New Hampshire Department of Highway Safety. This is a federal grant that is given to law enforcement agencies across the country. The primary function is to provide extra motor vehicle enforcement patrols throughout the county and Lempster. These patrols include "Safe Commute", which is based on speed and cell phone use, "Join the New Hampshire Click", as well as "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over". The main goal of these Highway Safety grant patrol details is to try and reduce the increase in traffic fatalities that have occurred across the state over the past few years. New Hampshire has had fifteen fatalities this year-to-date. The Sheriff's Office has applied for the 2024 grant year. Please do not get behind the wheel if you feel under the influence to any degree.

The Claremont Dispatch Center received 262 calls for service as of December 18, 2023. If you need assistance or believe that you are the victim of a crime, please contact the Claremont Police Dispatch Center at 603-542-9538. They will dispatch the Sheriff's Office or New Hampshire State Police to assist you. Best wishes for 2024.

Mary Elizabeth Grenier

Selectman, UVLSRPC Commissioner, Wife, Mother, Grandmother and Friend October 19, 1941 ~ June 26, 2023



In 1982 Mary Grenier and her husband Jim bought and moved to a run-down farm on Benway Hill in Lempster. Although located on a beautiful hilltop location, there was endless work to be done on the house, barn and land. After many years of upgrades to both the farm buildings and land, it was possible for Mary to focus on the workings of the town. She loved the open land, wildlife, raising livestock and the many new friends she and her husband connected with. She was attentive to the function of the town government and decided she wanted to work toward making improvements in the operation of the town.

She decided to run for selectman in 1994. She met with the folks at the Jolly Farmer to gain their support and spent many hours at the Lempster transfer station (town dump back then). She was elected in March to begin her service to the residents of Lempster and continued to serve the town until August 2001 when she resigned for personal reasons. She again ran and was elected in March of 2007 serving until she passed from this world in June of 2023. She also served on the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission from December 2013 to February 2023.

While serving during these times, she worked with other board members to improve town roads and properties including a suitable highway building and a new fire station. Her work on the UVLSPC helped the town secure funds to study and remediate contamination at the land where the new Fire Station was built. This land was previously owned by the Jolly Farmer organization and was purchased with a generous donation from Steve and Caroline Fellows. It will potentially serve as the location for future town buildings to accompany the fire station.

Mary had a supportive and pleasant attitude toward town employees; always focusing on the positive qualities of the person. Each year she and her husband had a large vegetable garden that produced way more than they needed. They never sold vegetables, but gave away what they did not use to friends, neighbors and others. Often the others were town employees or personnel. Mary spent many hours making relishes, pickles or jams to be given away to the same folks at Christmas. Mary shined when she brought each town employee or personnel their Christmas gifts. These were gifts of love from her.

People fortunate enough to work with Mary loved her for her compassionate and caring nature, her fairness and ability to see all sides of a situation and of course her great sense of humor.

She rarely (if ever) missed a town event whether it be a concert, a dinner, a dance or anything in between, if it benefited her beloved Lempster she was there showing her support. Mary's support did not end at the town borders, she also gave generously to several surrounding community programs.

One thing is certain, her absence will never go unnoticed to those she blessed with her unconditional love and support.
